(BOSTON) – On February 8<sup>th</sup>, 2023, Actors' Shakespeare Project proudly returns to Hibernian Hall with one of the most celebrated plays of August Wilson's Century Cycle: **Seven Guitars**.

In Pittsburgh's historic Hill District, six friends gather to mourn and reminisce after the untimely death of blues guitarist Floyd "Schoolboy" Barton. As the characters recount Floyd's last days in 1948, **Seven Guitars** spins a tale of what happens when dreams of stardom collide with harsh reality. With bawdy comedy and enchanting blues rhythms, Wilson's Pulitzer- and Tony-nominated script explores faith, oppression, love, and the music that binds us together.

**August Wilson** is one of the the most lauded American playwrights of the twentieth century, known particularly for his Century Cycle - a series of ten plays that examine the African diaspora and Black life in the United States from the 1900s to the 1990s. All ten were produced on Broadway, and garnered Wilson ten Tony nominations as well as the Tony Award for Best Play (*Fences*), two Tony Awards for Best Revival (*Fences, Jitney*), and two Pulitzer Prizes for Drama (*Fences, The Piano Lesson*). On October 16, 2005, Broadway renamed the theater located at 245 West 52nd Street, The August Wilson Theatre. In August of 2022, Wilson's childhood home in Pittsburgh was reopened to the public as a historic landmark and artistic cultural center. He has been heralded by many as "The American Shakespeare."

ASP Resident Acting Company Member **Maurice Emmanuel Parent** will direct the Actors' Shakespeare Project production of **Seven Guitars**. As a director, Parent received acclaim for his work on Lyric Stage Company's *Breath & Imagination* and SpeakEasy Stage Company's *Choir Boy*. He has appeared in nine shows at ASP, including *Edward II*, for which he won the 2017 Elliot Norton Award for Outstanding Actor. He is the co-founder and Co-Producing Artistic Director of The Front Porch Arts Collective, a Black theater company committed to advancing racial equity through art.

**Seven Guitars** features ASP Resident Acting Company Members **Johnnie Mack** (*Othello*, *Pericles*, *King Henry VIII*) and **Omar Robinson** (*Pride and Prejudice*, *Much Ado About Nothing*, *Hamlet*), as well as Maya Carter, Anthony T Goss, Dereks Thomas, Valyn Lyric Turner, and Regine Vital.

The design team is Jon Savage (scenic); Nia Safarr Banks (costumes); Amanda E. Fallon (lighting); Dewey Dellay (music composition), and Abraham Joyner-Meyers (sound). Ashley Pitchford is the Production Stage Manager, and Kelsey Whipple is the Assistant Stage Manager.

**Seven Guitars** will run for four weeks, from February 8 through March 5, 2023 at Hibernian Hall (184 Dudley St #200, Boston, MA 02119).

Tickets are \$52.50, with an allotment of Pay-What-You-Can tickets released for the week's performances on the Monday of that week. There are student rush tickets available at the box office one hour prior to each performance for \$15. #### **PRODUCTION HISTORY**

**Seven Guitars** had its world premiere at Chicago's Goodman Theatre in January 1995, and debuted in Boston at the Huntington Theatre Company that same year. It opened on Broadway the following year at the Walter Kerr Theatre, where it ran for 188 performances and received eight Tony Award nominations. It was also nominated for the 1995 Pulitzer Prize for Drama.





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#### **ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT**

**August Wilson** (Playwright) authored *Gem of the Ocean, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, The Piano Lesson, Seven Guitars, Fences, Two Trains Running, Jitney, King Hedley II, and Radio Golf.* The ten play compilation is entitled The American Century Cycle. These works explore the heritage and experience of the descendants of Africans brought to North America as slaves, decade-by-decade, over the course of the twentieth century. Each of the Wilson plays have been produced on Broadway, at theaters across the country, and all over the world. In 2003, Wilson made his professional stage debut in his one-man show, *How I Learned What I Learned*.

His works garnered many awards including two Pulitzer Prizes for Drama (*Fences* in 1987 and *The Piano Lesson* in 1990), the 1987 Tony Award for Best Play (*Fences*), two Tony Awards for Best Revival of a Play (*Fences* in 2010 and *Jitney* in 2017), the 2002 Olivier Award for Best New Play (*Jitney*), the 2017 Olivier Award for Best Revival of a Play (*Ma Rainey's Black Bottom*), and seven Drama Critics Circle Awards. Additionally, the cast recording of *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom* received a 1985 Grammy Award, and Wilson received a 1995 Emmy Award nomination for his screenplay adaptation of *The Piano Lesson*.

During his life, Wilson received many fellowships and awards, including the Rockefeller and Guggenheim Fellowships in Playwriting, the Whiting Writers Award, the Heinz Award, and was awarded the 1999 National Humanities Medal by President Bill Clinton. He received numerous honorary degrees from colleges and universities, as well as the only high school diploma ever issued by the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh. Wilson's now famous TCG speech, The Ground on Which I Stand in 1996 triggered a great debate in the world of the American Theater.

On October 16, 2005, Broadway renamed the theater located at 245 West 52nd Street, The August Wilson Theatre. New York Public Radio recorded the entire American Century Cycle at the Greene Space, casting many of the original Broadway actors. PBS aired a documentary on Wilson entitled, "The Ground On Which I Stand," as part of the American Masters series. Wilson's screenplay for the 2017 feature film, *Fences* starring Denzel Washington and Viola Davis, garnered him an Academy Award nomination. Recently, The August Wilson African American Cultural Center in Pittsburgh opened a permanent exhibit under its roof, solely dedicated to the playwright's artistic legacy. In August of 2022, Wilson's childhood home in Pittsburgh was reopened to the public as a historic landmark and artistic cultural center, and his full archives now being housed at Pittsburgh University.

Though born in Pittsburgh, Wilson resided in Seattle when he passed away in 2005. He is survived by his daughters, Sakina Ansari Wilson and Azula Carmen Wilson, and his wife, costume designer, and Executive Director of the August Wilson Legacy LLC, Constanza Romero-Wilson. (*he/him*)

**Maurice Emmanuel Parent** is an award-winning actor, director, educator and mentor with twenty years of professional experience. He has over forty acting credits at theaters across the nation and abroad, having performed with some of Boston's oldest and most respected companies such as the Huntington Theatre Company, Commonwealth Shakespeare Company, SpeakEasy Stage Company, Lyric Stage Company, New Repertory Theatre, Central Square Theater, and has been a Resident Acting Company member at Actors' Shakespeare Project since 2011.

His work as an actor has earned him two Elliot Norton Awards from The Boston Theater Critics Association, three Independent Reviewers of New England (IRNE) awards, and an ArtsImpulse Award. Parent's history as an educator extends back over a decade. He's taught for Northeastern University, MIT, The Boston Conservatory at Berklee, and spent six years as a Performing Arts Specialist in the Boston Public School System. Currently, Parent is a full time Professor of the Practice in the Tufts Department of Theatre, Dance, and Performance Studies.

Parent is the co-founder of The Front Porch Arts Collective, a black theatre company committed to advancing racial equity in Boston through theater. In its sixth season, The Porch has quickly become a well-respected voice in the Boston theatrical landscape. In residence at the Huntington Theatre Company, Parent serves as both Co-Producing Artistic Director of The Porch and Consulting Producer for The Huntington. (*he/him*)
